## What is this project?

The NoCo Places Unauthorized Trails Project is a region-wide effort to address the environmental, safety, and management impacts of unauthorized (“social”) trails on public lands in Northern Colorado. The project is funded to restore high-impact unauthorized trails and, where appropriate, evaluate whether some routes should be studied for potential adoption.

NoCo Places does not decide what happens on the ground. We serve as a neutral convener, supporting land managers with data, coordination, project management, and stakeholder input.

## Who makes decisions?

**Land managers decide.** Public agencies have final authority for actions on their jurisdictions.

**Partners inform.** Recreation and conservation partners provide local knowledge and feedback.

**Data guides priorities.** Decisions are based on mapped trail and habitat data utilizing a standardized criteria.

**Environmental compliance applies.** All actions must meet safety, legal, and environmental requirements.

## How the Process Works

- 1. Data development** – A regional dashboard maps unauthorized trails and key biodiversity and wildlife habitat. Agency prioritization – Agencies identify priority areas using a region wide evaluation framework.
- 2. Partner input** – Partners provide input and their feedback on draft priorities.
- 3. Feasibility review** – Trails suggested for adoption are screened for safety, environmental, planning constraints, and long-term maintenance costs.
- 4. Final decisions** – Agencies determine which trails are restored, studied further, or monitored.
- 5. Public release** – A transparent action plan explains outcomes and rationale.

# Why are unauthorized (“social”) trails an issue?

Many social trails start with good intentions, but unmanaged routes can cause long-term problems:

**Environmental damage** – erosion, habitat fragmentation, and impacts to wildlife and water.

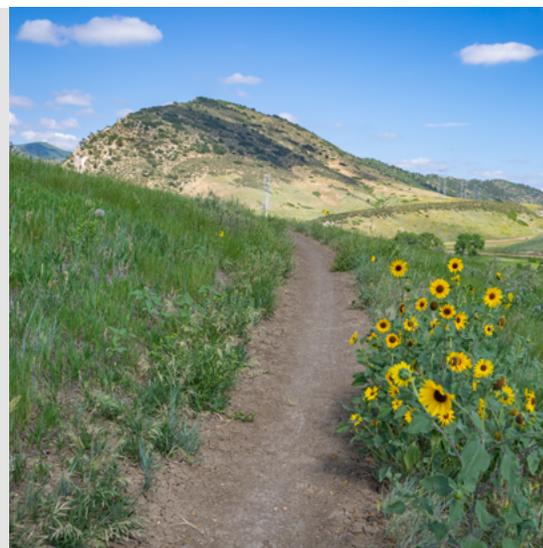
**Safety risks** – steep, unstable, poorly designed, or trails without navigational aids can increase injuries and rescues.

**Legal and funding risk** – agencies face liability and may jeopardize grant eligibility.

**System impacts** – unmanaged trails pull users away from sustainable, planned trail systems.
